
DIY PDs are in-person unless otherwise noted.

City Neighbors Charter School Receives a Grant for Green Renovation

City Neighbors Foundation received a \$148,880 grant from the Chesapeake Bay Trust to conduct а complete green renovation of the City Neighbors Charter parking lot, located in northeast Baltimore City. Installations include 1270 sq. ft. of microbioretention, 1679 sq. ft. of pervious paving, and a 105 sq. ft. rain garden, all of which will be open for exploration by students, their families, and the general public.

CITY NEIGHBORS CLASSROOMS AT WORK



Juxtaposition in 12th Grade AP Literature

Seniors in AP Lit talked about juxtaposition in Tim O'Brien's *The Things They Carried*. The author often mixes contradictory tones, images, language, and even events to create tension and discomfort in the reader--which is exactly what the soldiers he writes about faced. His writing style enables the reader to put ourselves in their shoes, if only in a small, protected way.

Students analyzed that juxtaposition and interpreted it as they saw fit into an art project. These photos show Tianna Hunt's clay sculpture and Caitlyn McGuire's drawing, both depicting a checkers game board and a fallen soldier--a reflection of the mix of games and violence often seen in the book.

The 11th Grade Interview Project

In the interview project, we developed deep, meaningful questions and listened closely to the stories others told us. Along the way, we explored ways writers shape stories from an initial act of listening.

We investigated interviews and interviewing, and we experimented with the raw materials of questions and answers to craft coherent, meaningful profiles that reveal the depth of people all around us.







Inquiry Learning in High School Art

This year the high school art students followed an adapted Inquiry model to help them work in a manner that more closely resembles the way artists work. Students developed their own driving questions around subjects they were interested in learning more about. Next students introduced their initial thoughts, then researched their question until they were ready to brainstorm ways of using what they learned as a catalyst for art work. Students time spent experimenting with media before starting the final creation.

Middle School Math in the City Neighbors Fabrication Lab

The 8th grade math class took a field trip to the City Neighbors Fabrication Lab. Each student designed and built a passive speaker to fit their phone. They used the lab's miter saw, drill press and band saw to build their speakers out of plywood. For many students it was their first experience with woodworking.





1st Grade: Can We Prevent Extinction?

As a part of our yearlong project on endangered animals, first graders were moved to action on behalf of the animals we studied. This year, we did an in-depth study on the major causes of endangerment and the most critically endangered animals. We worked hard to answer the question "*Can we prevent extinction?*". After our research, students determined that preventing extinction is possible, and the best way to do so is by protecting animal habitats.

Students created and designed advocacy stickers with their animal of study, a bit of its habitat and a slogan to help others understand the importance of protecting them. All proceeds from the sale will go to support endangered animals and wild life.


4th Grade Monarch Project

Fourth graders are sitting around a Monarch butterfly mural on our very own playground at CNCS discussing the insects that were spotted in designated areas of our playground.

Students observed bees, crickets, ant farms, and other very interesting insects. This was an introduction to our Monarch Madness Project!



Kindergarten "What's Inside" Project



Kindergarten worked to answer the question "What's inside?". We began by sketching the different parts of citrus fruit before moving to what's inside of us. The children drew life sized pictures showing what they knew. After researching the human body through nonfiction texts, they used collage techniques to make body vests showing what they learned about the organs inside their torsos.





4th and 5th Graders and Natural Disasters

Fourth and fifth graders from City Neighbors Hamilton spent the spring exploring and researching natural disasters. We learned about what causes different disasters, where they are historically located, and the impacts they have on people.

Throughout our natural disasters study, students have wondered about ways to prevent or warn people prior to a disaster. We created structures with marshmallows and toothpicks to mimic tall buildings and tested their ability to withstand earthquakes using Jello.
