



MSDE Collaborative

Through a grant from the Maryland State Department of Education, the City Neighbors Foundation has launched a one-year professional development initiative with four local schools — two neighborhood schools and two public charter schools.

I will write my verse like a poet with his pen.


A story.








3rd graders at City Neighbors Hamilton examining the life cycles of insects...as they engage in a project study leading to their own self-designed insects.






Kindergarten started our project study on houses. We engaged in our first observational drawing by stepping outside and sketching our own houses. After a discussion of siding, bricks, and stucco, the children drew new drafts with added details. They traced the lines in sharpie and used watercolor to either represent the actual color or a desired color.







4th and 5th grade students, with teacher Tracy Pendred, launch their project study of Maryland native plants. Even virtual learning won't get in the way of hands-on, authentic project-based learning at City Neighbors.





AP Seminar students at CNHS - with Ms. Lewis - learned zine techniques taught by visiting artist Georgia McCandlish. They then created a perzine that explored a concept integral to who they are, from their own perspective. They then "inverted" the zine and explored the concept from a different perspective or lens, creating a reversible book representing 2 unique ways to explore one concept.


The 5th grade class with Ms. Cohen explored the mindfulness practice of drawing mandalas both by hand and digitally. Students are now working on applying their knowledge of radial symmetry by creating mono-prints at home using foam and washable markers.







Fourth graders at CNH with Ms. Murphy are in the midst of a mini-project to design their own reservoir at home, just starting their designs. Launching with a study of the chlorine spill in Baltimore, students then learned about the Lake Montebello reservoir. Next week they will make noticings about the evaporation of our reservoirs and brainstorm ways to conserve water sources.







3rd graders with Ms. Butcher are learning to work like scientists, making observations using their senses and making detailed observations and scientific drawings. Here are some of their first sketches!




City Neighbors Joins the Bridges Collaborative



City Neighbors is very proud to share that we have been selected as one of fifty-six organizations across the nation to participate in the inaugural Bridges Collaborative, an initiative designed by The Century Foundation, to promote the intersection of equity and integration in our neighborhoods and schools. This two-year cohort pairs housing organizations, large school districts, and charter schools across the nation who have shown a deep commitment to the work of integration and equity to find ways to deepen the work and push for policy and practice that acknowledges the powerful intersection between these two ideals.

City Neighbors also was invited to lead a workshop at the inaugural convening about our journey in diversifying our staff over the last decade.

City Neighbors Is a Baltimore Ceasefire School

City Neighbors Charter School has become an official Baltimore Ceasefire School. As one of just 7 Ceasefire schools in Baltimore City, we started our partnership by offering training to interested students, parents, staff, and community. We'll also participate in quarterly Ceasefire Weekends (Feb / May / Aug / Nov) by holding life-affirming events as defined by our student ambassadors and adult supporters. Baltimore Ceasefire's mission supports our school culture through conflict resolution, non-violence, restorative justice, strength in community, and student-led life affirming programming.

In November, City Neighbors sponsored "Fun on Wheels" – an event focused on exercise and friendship. It came out of a 6th grade advisory conversation about missing friends and the importance of getting outside for play and mental health during the pandemic. The event was part of the life-affirming Ceasefire Weekend, also known as the Baltimore Peace Challenge.

DIY PD at City Neighbors




